




Mary Strehlow enters responses at the World Café.







Monica Meyer and Faythe Aiken discuss the importance of quality care.

Questions

- What kind of subsidies or support programs are there for autistic adults who need housing help but do <u>not</u> qualify for a waiver or DDA support? Tie in with mental health (suicide, anxiety, depression). Poverty program tie-in?
- What financial assistance is there for families without the \$ to build an ADU?
- Most of the housing options are only available to those on CORE waivers. what about the rest of our kids on B+? Only AFHs?
- Is there financial assistance to help median-income families build an ADU for their disabled family member?
- I have a VH Home mortgage benefit that I'm not using. Is there a way veterans like me can use this to finance a home for my disabled child (name and phone number provided)
- Who can we talk to individually about housing options and what might work best for us? ...feeling overwhelmed
- We need a residential 'broker'. Someone who knows what is available in our area and will listen to our list of needs and wants and take us around to visit them.
- Curious about intentional communities with set asides for DD but open to families, low income, etc.
- Would like referrals for consultant re: setting up home with other, i.e., people who have done it, people who know who/what/why

Ideas

- More options for single people
- Need a regular group of people to exchange ideas and concerns
- As a single aging parent, I would like to find a facility for both my son and myself. So that when I am gone, he will still have a home and people to care for him.
- With DDA only funding the supports part of housing, why do they hold the power to decide <u>where</u> clients are referred? If on core waiver, DDA has to provide referral to Agencies, not clients or families deciding where.

- Glossary of acronyms both service & housing 'resources' (ie "Waivers", DDA, etc)





- For those of us who can't be at all the sessions as above, it would be wonderful to have sessions recorded to watch later.

Keynote Speaker George Braddock, President of Creative Housing Solutions

Material Covered:

The critical role of the physical environment in promoting independence, self-determination and improving the quality of life for individuals with developmental disabilities in community settings. There are numerous examples where the failure of the environment to respond to the needs of the person resulted in the failure of the supports and the individual with disabilities moving to a more restrictive setting. Traditionally, the focus of person-centered planning has been on assuring appropriate supports and programs and has ignored the role of the physical environment.
